From the Selectboard

We applaud the initiative taken by the Newsletter Committee to provide Conway residents with *Conway Currents*, the successor to the *Visitor*, each a valuable community publication with important town information.

We are going through unprecedented times with the coronavirus pandemic. Fortunately, Franklin County has the lowest number of confirmed COVID-19 cases among major counties, according to the Massachusetts Department of Public Health (MA DPH). Conway has reportedly had one confirmed case, and that person has recovered, according to reports.

During this very stressful time, we are primarily concerned about the health and safety of our residents. Please continue to follow all of the recommendations of the MA DPH to reduce the spread of the coronavirus.

Our second major concern is the financial health of the town. The economic shutdown of the commonwealth has resulted in major declines in state revenues that will affect the amount of state aid to the town for FY2021 starting July 1. We had developed a very sound and financially palatable budget for FY2021 that is now being reworked based on a number of potential financial scenarios that are dependent on the budget decisions of the governor and the legislature. Our objective is to develop a new FY2021 budget that will be financially flexible, provide for essential services, and have low impact on property taxes.

Due to both the pandemic and financial uncertainly at the commonwealth level, we have postponed the annual Town Meeting scheduled for May 11 until Monday, June 8. If the public heath situation is still unsettled at that date, we will be able to postpone again. Although town offices will be closed to the public until further notice, town staff members are working and available by phone and mail for any needed public services. During this state of emergency our health, public safety, and emergency personnel are on high alert. A concerted community-wide effort here in Conway that includes an increased awareness of and attention to our neighbors, particularly those who are most vulnerable, will help us get through this public health emergency with the least impact on the health and safety of our residents.

From the Town Administrator

Town Meeting has indeed been postponed, as I mentioned last month might happen. June 8 is the new target date, although the moderator can postpone again if necessary. The selectboard and I are working on a revised budget for FY2021 based on expected lower state and town revenues. We'll also need to coordinate with other Frontier District towns to set that school's budget.

In the meantime, work is expected to begin on restoring the Town Hall cupola, a project proposed by the Community Preservation Committee (thank you, Malcolm Corse!) and funded by Town Meeting. We also expect work to begin soon on the Highway Maintenance Building. The winner of the bid was the same company that built the shed (where finish work will continue with the warmer weather). Construction is challenging because of physical distancing but not impossible with new state requirements. The town received a Forest Stewardship grant to create plans for the two town forests; see the winning quote on the Town Administrator's page on the town website, <u>www.townofconway.com</u>. I made sure our proposal included two public meetings to get residents' opinions, but that will be challenging given the restriction on in-person gatherings. We have asked for an extension but have not received word, and we are working with the state and the consultants on possible options.

Don't forget to check the town website for updates on COVID-19 and some informative links, and remember that committees have conference lines for meetings to ensure that these are open meetings to which anyone can call in. See the website calendar listings and click on them for the numbers to call (you can call on your phone and enter the PIN to join, even for meetings on Zoom).

Meanwhile, enjoy the long, slow spring and fresh air, with the possibility that frosts are behind us and days in the 60s will become common.

Senior Services

Free Home Repairs for Seniors Handymen are available to do, free of charge, minor home repairs for seniors with the greatest economic and social need. Although the labor is free, homeowners are responsible for the cost of all needed parts and materials. Minor home repairs include screen and broken window replacement, handrail installation, and small carpentry, plumbing, and electrical repairs. Donations are accepted. This program is funded by a grant from LifePath under Title III of the Older Americans Act and the Church Street Home Fund. If you need help with a small problem, call Pat Lynch at 369-4284.

Durable Medical Equipment Loans The COA has items of durable medical equipment available for loan. Currently on hand are wheelchairs, walkers (with and without seats), crutches, canes, tub and shower chairs, commodes, and raised toilet seats. LifePath Provides Essential Services During the COVID-19 Crisis

LifePath is here to help Conway residents during this pandemic. We are open for business, going strong, and continuing to offer support for elders, people with disabilities, and caregivers. We are responding to the changing needs of the people we serve and offering services to new people. We are also staying current on COVID-19 developments and communicating these to callers. In addition, we have created a

We have moved most of our administrative functions off-site. Although our physical office is closed to the public, staff are continuing to communicate with and assess consumers via telephone and video connections. Home health aides and personal care attendants are still visiting homes and offering care to those who need it. Our Elder Protective Services department is here to help at a time when domestic violence is on the increase due to COVID-19. If you suspect an elder is at risk for physical or emotional injury or through self-neglect, call the Massachusettsbased Elder Abuse Hotline at 1-800-922-2275 or file a report online. LifePath also has the capacity to help people who want to avoid short-term rehab stays and those who currently live in nursing homes but wish to move home for the time being.

LifePath continues to deliver Meals on Wheels and provide a critical wellness check during the COVID-19 pandemic. To keep Meals on Wheels recipients and volunteers safe, LifePath has implemented the "Smile and Wave" method, wherein drivers arrive at a recipient's house, use hand sanitizer or put on a new pair of gloves, place the meal on an outside table or pack the meal in a plastic bag and hang it on the doorknob, knock or ring the doorbell, and immediately step back 10 to 15 feet. When the Meals on Wheels recipient answers the door, drivers say "hello," indicate where the meal is, and make sure the recipient is able to retrieve it, before continuing on with deliveries.

If no one answers, the critical wellness check begins. Drivers call the recipient to make sure they are home. If no one answers, drivers report the lack of response to LifePath staff, who call the recipient's emergency contacts, their doctor's office, and then emergency services.

We have provided proper personal protective equipment (PPE) to all front-line workers to maintain their safety as well as that of those receiving care. We want to thank the many generous people who responded to our request for PPE donations and welcome additional contributions of homemade masks. We continue to recruit backup volunteers should current volunteers or staff be unable to work or should new needs emerge. Over 100 members of LifePath's community have registered as backup volunteers, which is both inspiring and heartwarming. All volunteers are CORI checked and trained before being asked to serve the community. One of the most important ways to support us during this critical time of increased need is to donate to Lifepath or take part in LifePath's 2020 Virtual Walkathon. Together we will work through this pandemic and keep our community strong.

Hilltown Churches Food Pantry

The Hilltown Churches Food Pantry is located at 429 Main Street, Ashfield, in Friendship Hall, downstairs in Ashfield Congregational Church. It serves the eleven hill towns of Ashfield, Buckland, Charlemont, Colrain, Conway, Hawley, Heath, Monroe, Plainfield, Rowe, and Shelburne. The only requirement for joining the food pantry is proof of residency in one of these towns and a simple statement of need. There are no income requirements. Food distribution is held every other Tuesday from 2:00 to 6:00 p.m. Emergency food is available during off hours. For detailed information on the procedure being practiced during the COVID-19 crisis, phone 413-625-0020.

The pantry relies on donations of both money and food for our continued operation. We are able to stretch our money by shopping at the Food Bank of Western Mass., as they provide most foods free and a few for 19 cents/lb. Last year we gave out 85,616 pounds of food to those in need. We spend 96–98 percent of our budget directly on food.

Emergency Management Department Update

The Conway EMD Team – consisting of the Emergency Management Director and Assistant Director, the Town Administrator, Selectboard Chair, Board of Health Chair, and the Police, Fire, and Ambulance Departments – is working through weekly conference calls to monitor local conditions and information coming from the state concerning the coronavirus. In these challenging times, in order to keep you and your loved ones safe, please remember to always:

- Wash your hands with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after any outside trips.
- Avoid touching your face, mouth, or eyes, as this is where the virus enters the body.
- Keep a minimum of 6 feet apart from other people when in public, and always wear a face mask or bandana.
- Limit your public outings to the essentials, such as trips to the grocery store or pharmacy.

Talkin' Trash

The annual transfer station permit stickers for the new year will become available on June 1, 2020, and must be in place on your vehicle for entry into the transfer station by August 1, 2020. Stickers cost \$10.00 and can be paid for through the town's website at <u>https://townofconway.com/</u>. Go to the "View or Pay a Bill" webpage after June 1, where you will find directions on how to purchase the sticker. Once you have completed your purchase, stickers may be picked up at the transfer station from the gate attendants during normal open hours. Please be sure to have your receipt on hand as proof of purchase. Stickers must be affixed to the front windshield in the same place as last year, in the center of the windshield behind the rearview mirror. This placement is

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essential for attendants to be able to quickly identify properly permitted vehicles.

As a point of reference, permit sticker prices in many of the towns surrounding Conway are more expensive, and some towns charge not only for permit stickers but also per bag of trash. Some examples of other local permit sticker prices are: Ashfield \$40.00, Deerfield \$65.00, Northampton \$25.00, and Amherst and Williamsburg \$100.00. Our \$10.00 sticker is a bargain!!

Please also remember to wear a mask when visiting the transfer station, do not get closer than six feet from the attendants or other residents, and do not linger to chat. This too shall pass; stay safe and be well!

Update from the Field Memorial Library

The coronavirus-induced shutdown has been disruptive for us all, and the library is no exception. The library is closed physically until at least May 4. This may be extended, so please check our website before coming to the library. Wi-fi from the library is accessible from the library steps and somewhat from the street. The password has been removed.

Please do not return books to the book drop. Overdue fines have been waived. We will be glad to have items returned when the stay-at-home order has been lifted.

Because FML is not digitized, we do not have direct connections to CWMars for online books and other resources. However, instructions are posted on our website for getting a Boston Public Library e-card online and then navigating to and borrowing from their eBooks selections and other online resources. This has added value, because a BPL eCard also allows one to use CWMars's online resources. This is a special arrangement from the state during the shutdown.

Garden Club Notes

May is a delightful – and busy – time for gardeners, with warming temperatures and frost-free nights. Mulching becomes important to keep soil moist through hotter daytime temperatures, and you may need to water more frequently. Here are some other springtime tips:

- Most spring-flowering bulbs have finished blooming by now. Deadhead them, leaving foliage in place until it dies on their own. This will prevent them from wasting energy in seed-production.
- This is also the time to prune early-flowering shrubs such as lilacs, forsythia, and azaleas shortly after they finish

blooming. If you wait too long to prune, you will be removing next-year's developing buds.

- Harvest any remaining cold-season vegetables, such as leafy greens, peas, and asparagus.
- Once night temperatures remain above 50 degrees and all danger of frost has passed, you can safely plant warm-season vegetables and frost-sensitive herbs. It's also safe to set out tomato plants.

The aims of the Conway Garden Club are to stimulate interest in gardening and related skills, to enhance the natural beauty of our area, and to educate and promote environmental improvement. The club welcomes suggestions for projects that would benefit the town. And, as always, we welcome new members. Friends of Conway Pollinator Project

As of this writing, Massachusetts Audubon lands in Conway and elsewhere are closed for all work projects, and Audubon staff members are working from home as part of the COVID-19 shutdown. The Friends of Conway pollinator project on Audubon land has been planned and funded and will move forward immediately once Audubon gives us the green light. Tom Sullivan of Pollinators Welcome will manage the project. The planned half-acre pollinator field on Audubon land on the south side of Route 116, supported by a \$12,000 grant from Conway's Community Preservation Committee, will move forward in three stages. This year we will lay down strips of black plastic to kill grass and weeds that would crowd out pollinator plantings. In the spring of 2021, the plastic comes up and the plantings begin. In the spring of 2022, the year-old plantings will be given an abundance of tender loving care. Using the Square device when you shop is hugely helpful in saving us time in the office so we can be outside growing food for you!
