

## A Visit with the Newest Selectboard Member, Erica Goleman

Recently, I had the pleasure of interviewing Erica Goleman, our newest member of the Conway Selectboard.

Erica came to the area from Portland, Oregon, by way of Alaska while pursuing an MA in Education from Smith College. Her husband, Govinddass's, family lives in Haydenville, MA, and so they were already familiar with Massachusetts. When Erica's course was completed in 1998, they began to look for a place to raise their family. They had hoped to locate within the city of Northampton; however, when they found a home in Conway – which initially seemed remote – they felt it was the perfect place for them!



In 1999 their first daughter was born. In the years that followed, they added two more daughters and a son. Their eldest daughters are attending Cornell and the University of New Mexico, and the two youngest children will be attending Four Rivers School in the fall. Erica works as the Manager of Web and New Media at Greenfield Community College. Her husband is an architectural

metalworker. When not welding new pieces of art for his clients, he enjoys the science of brewing.

I asked Erica what got her interested in politics. She credited her family, and especially her mother, with fostering in her the importance of politics and the political process as well as the value of being a politically active person. She mused that when she was a young child, her mother would take her out of the classroom, and they would go the polling place in the school gym where Erica could observe the voting process. Erica said, with a smile in her voice, that she could not recall an election when she had not joined her mother in the booth. She remembers those days even as a voter herself. She believes it is important to model an interest in local politics for her family.

As a long-time resident of Conway, Erica served as a member of the Fireman's Auxiliary for nearly twenty years, with fifteen of those as its treasurer.

Although this is her first foray into local politics, Erica is invigorated by the task of undertaking all there is to learn. "It is interesting and exciting! The selectboard is a great group of people! Tom, the town administrator, has been immensely helpful, and Bob is super-solid in his new role as chair of the selectboard.."

She is happy supporting and growing Conway's future in the decisions that lie ahead. "Being a part of the selectboard feels great – natural!"

#### Get Your Flu Shot!

Flu vaccine is an important preventive in any year, and this is definitely not just another year! Preventing flu during the COVID pandemic is even more important. Member Towns of FRCOG's Cooperative Public Health Service are working together to provide residents in the region with several opportunities for flu vaccination this season. The Conway Board of Health is helping to plan these events:

**NOTE:** State public health officials have announced that influenza immunization will be required for all children six months of age or older who are attending Massachusetts child care, preschool, K-12, and colleges and universities. The new vaccine requirement is an important step to reduce flu-related illness and the overall impact of respiratory illness during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Students will be expected to have received a flu vaccine by December 31, 2020, for the 2020-2021 influenza season, unless either a medical or religious exemption is provided. Also exempted are K-12 students who are homeschooled and higher education students who are completely off-campus and engaged in remote learning only. This new flu immunization requirement to enter school in January is in addition to existing vaccine requirements for all those attending child care, preschool, K-12, and colleges and universities in Massachusetts. Elementary and secondary students in districts and schools that are using a remote education model are not exempt.

# About the Birds and the Bees at Natural Roots David Fisher

Two graduate-student ornithologist friends from Umass have been conducting songbird research at Natural Roots for several years. In 2017 Isabel Brofsky began assessing the songbird populations living here and on other small, integrated farms in the area. Her work has identified the bird species that are most commonly found on these farms and what habitats are particularly good for specific species. Of the farms that she studied, Natural Roots is home to one of the most diverse and abundant songbird populations. Our flycatcher and swallow populations are especially diverse, with six species of flycatcher and the steeply declining bank swallow also present.

Since 2019, Sam Mayne has been working to assess the amount to which songbird populations benefit farms by reducing pest insects. He believes that, by eating pests, songbirds increase crop yield and decrease the need for pesticide use. So far he has collected samples from 99 birds on Natural Roots. Using DNA analysis, he will determine the diet of each bird, looking for crop pests. Preliminary analyses show that birds decrease pests in brassica and cucurbit crops.

In a study of another important wild population, Alison Fowler, a Ph.D. candidate in the Department of Biology at UMass Amherst, is collecting bees at different area farms to understand how the landscape affects their health. Alison studies bee health by looking at the bacteria that live in the bee's gut. Gut microbes play a big role in our health; they help us digest food, and certain bacteria are correlated with certain diseases. Bees also have gut microbes that affect their health, but much more research is needed to fully understand these links. New England has lots of amazing wild bee species, and we know that many suffer from diseases. Alison is studying bee gut microbes in the Adler Lab, which has recently discovered that when bees eat pollen from sunflowers, they have fewer gut parasites.

She is curious to see if this link between food and disease is driven by changes in bees' gut microbes and hopes to visit farms in the Pioneer Valley that differ in the amount of sunflowers planted to see if bees foraging in a landscape with lots of sunflowers (and not much else) have different gut microbes from bees in landscapes with a variety of flowering species, including some sunflowers, or one with no sunflowers. Natural Roots has many flowering crops, including our lovely row of you-pick sunflowers, so our farm will serve as a site in the middle category.

Alison hopes to collect individuals of three different types of bees: bumble bees, sweat bees, and leafcutter bees. By looking at different species, she hopes to see if any patterns are general or species-specific. We look forward to sharing her findings!

#### Garden Club Notes

As Bob Dylan sang, "The times they are a'changin'." With only three weeks of summer left until the autumnal equinox arrives on the 22nd, this is a transitional time. The chirping of crickets is an almost constant buzz, and the changing light as the days grow shorter accentuates the passage of time. There's a lot to do in the garden before wintry weather begins to be felt.

- This is the time to improve the soil by spreading a layer of compost or rotted manure and spading or rototilling it into the soil. Planting a cover crop such as rye grass will help control erosion during the winter.
- Plant spring-flowering bulbs now, selecting a variety of bulbs that bloom at different times to ensure color from spring into early summer.
- Before the first frost, dig up and store tender bulbs such as dahlias and cannas.
- Harvest tender vegetables as soon as frost is predicted. You
  can leave winter squash until frost kills the leaves, when
  growth will stop.

The aims of the Conway Garden Club are to stimulate interest in gardening and related skills, to enhance the natural beauty of our area, and to educate and promote environmental improvement. ## Update from the Field Memorial Library

The Field Memorial Library (FML) remains closed to physical visits as major renovations to the library dome, heating and lighting systems, and other details are underway. This is in addition to our work developing a reopening plan that will ensure safety when we do reopen. We appreciate your patience while these major systems are updated to improve the experience of being in the library and we work out the pesky details to ensure the safety of all who visit. As reported elsewhere in *Conway Currents*, the Friends of the Field Memorial Library created a 1920 "period piece" march on Saturday, August 15, to celebrate the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment giving women the right to vote and to award the Friends scholarship to Ms Pitittieri. We are grateful to all who created and participated in these events. At the event, women residents of Conway who qualify to vote in their first election this fall were given a copy of Elizabeth Cady Stanton's 1882 appeal for women's right to vote, *The Solitude of Self*. All residents who will vote for the first time this fall are invited to contact the library and arrange to receive a copy of this book as an expression of how "history matters."

FML's "steps-side" process for picking up materials and returning them to our outside book drop is continuing. In the weeks ahead our pickup schedules are subject to change due to the renovations, so please check our website for the most up-to-date schedule. To help you know what is in *some* of the FML collections, we have

added a "Collections" page to our website at <a href="https://fieldmemoriallibrary.org">https://fieldmemoriallibrary.org</a>. This page has links to several online spreadsheets – to which we continue to add – showing portions of our collections that may be browsed or searched. You can also request any item and we will search our collection, and if we do not have it, we will try to obtain it for you. The Inter-Library Loan (ILL) process has restarted, and this helps us to obtain items from other libraries. ## Field Memorial Library March and Scholarship

The Friends of the Field Memorial Library held a celebratory march in Conway on Saturday, August 15, for the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the 19<sup>th</sup> Amendment. More than 30 people joined the procession up and down Conway's main street. The women were dressed in 1920s attire. Everyone wore purple/white/yellow sashes proclaiming "Votes for Women" and carried placards with phrases from the 1900s supporting a woman's right to vote. In addition, the Friends presented their \$500 2020 scholarship to



Mackenzie Pitittieri (shown above). Attendees heard part of Ms. Pitittieri's winning essay on "How does the 100th anniversary of the 19th Amendment (giving women the right to vote in the United States) make a difference to the Town of Conway?" She wrote: "I am lucky to live in a town that reflects ideals of equality and supports every woman. Therefore, it is important that we celebrate the 19th Amendment because it makes us who we are as a town. Conway is sincerely a town like no other in the sense that we have developed a community so open to progressive ideals while still being able to maintain tradition."

As part of the celebration, the Friends plan an exhibit of the materials used in the march as soon as the library is fully able to reopen. ## Conway Cultural Council Grant Funding



While we don't know what the future has in store, we are hoping that a sense of normalcy will be restored in 2021, and in that vein, applications open October 1 for

proposals for community-oriented arts, humanities, and science programs. The deadline is November 16 for organizations, schools, and individuals to apply for grants that support cultural activities in the community.

These grants can support a variety of artistic projects benefiting the people of Conway, including exhibits, festivals, field trips, short-term artist residencies, or performances inschools, workshops, and lectures. Preference will be given to applicants from Conway and/or programs that take place in Conway.

The Conway Cultural Council is part of a network of 329 local cultural councils serving all 351 cities and towns in the Commonwealth. The LCC Program is the largest grassroots cultural funding network in the nation, supporting thousands of community-based projects in the arts, sciences, and humanities every year. The state legislature provides an annual appropriation to the Massachusetts Cultural Council, a state agency, which then allocates funds to each community.

Previously funded projects include nature walks, school programs, musical performances, and lectures. We prefer to fund events that will take place live between July 2020 and December 2021. Alternately, an online offering is an option if the project lends itself to this format. During the spring of 2020 when social gatherings were not possible, the Charlemont Forum went virtual in a dynamic event titled "Forging an Earth Ethic in aTime of Crisis." You can view this at

#### Using Conway's Transfer Station

The Transfer Station is located on Old Cricket Hill Road and is open to receive trash and recyclables on:

- Saturdays, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- Sundays, 8 a.m. to 1 p.m.
- Wednesdays, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Hazardous Waste Collection – first Saturday of the month, 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. Hazardous waste collection is provided for limited types of household hazardous waste, such as automotive products (used motor oil, oil filters, transmission fluid, anti-freeze); mercury-containing devices (fluorescent lamps, button batteries, fever thermometers and thermostats); oil-based paints, thinners, lacquers, and other paint-related items; rechargeable nickel-cadmium batteries; and fluorescent lamp ballasts.

A permit is required to use the Conway Transfer Station. Board of Health Regulations state that the use of the transfer station is limited to Conway residents who have purchased and display a special permit sticker on their vehicle. Payment for the permits is now done through the online payment option on the Town's website and is \$10. Print out your receipt and take it to the transfer station during normal working hours where the gate attendants will give you your sticker.

Stickers will be displayed on the upper portion of the windshield of the vehicle, behind the rear-view mirror. This placement is essential for attendants to quickly identify properly permitted vehicles.
