#### New Board of Assessors Member

The Board of Assessors has a new member. George Forcier of Baptist Hill was elected on June 8 and brings a valuable background of experience to the board. We thank Roxanne Parent for her service and commitment to the board. She brought excellent questions and her detailed analytical research to the position. We will finish up the informative property record card data demonstration that she started.

Because of the continuing increase in selling prices of properties, at this time we expect to have another across-the-board increase in taxable values for the FY2024 bills coming out in September 2023 and April 2024. This action does generally reduce the tax rate, but there are no final figures yet available. We always hope that the reduction in the tax rate will offset the increase in our individual property values, giving us a small increase in the actual bill, but that remains to be seen.

As always, you are welcome to come in or call the office or email any questions that you may have. We want everyone who is interested to understand the property tax process and its abatements, exemptions, or other "sides." #### Notes from the Town Administrator

I think it's safe to say that town meeting could have run more smoothly this year. The selectboard met with members of the finance and capital improvements planning committees as well as our moderator on June 5 to discuss their ideas on what we can all do to make sure things work better in the future. Many of us have heard comments from our residents, which we greatly appreciate, as your input guides our process. If you would like to send in feedback, please do so through our "email us" link in the middle of the front page of the website at <a href="conwayma.gov">conwayma.gov</a>. We already know that we will have a special town meeting in December to vote on rights of way concerning the permanent replacement bridge on North Poland Road, and we will be making changes for that meeting based on all the feedback we've received so far, so if you have suggestions, please do chime in.

I also wanted to clarify that the new transfer station policy on bag stickers will not go into effect until October 7 and that the selectboard will hold another public forum on Thursday, September 14, to answer any questions you have about the new procedures. The current orange vehicle car decal will be good until October 7, and the new blue stickers will become available on September 1 at the town office, so you will get a little more time than normal on the orange sticker. The new blue vehicle car decal, which will include your license plate number, will be in effect from October 7, 2023, through June 30, 2024.

I would like to personally thank our retiring police chief, Ken Ouimette, for all his years of service and dedication to the town: 40 on the police department and 33 of them as our chief. Your standing ovation at town meeting shows you just how much the residents you have served all these years value and appreciate everything you have done for us. Thank you, Chief, and may you thoroughly enjoy your well-deserved retirement! I would also like

to welcome Don Bates of Whately, already a familiar face to many of us as he currently serves on Conway's police force, who will become our new chief on July 1. Welcome, Don. We look forward to working with you!

#### Notes from the Bluebird Boxes

The South River Meadow in downtown Conway continues to be a refuge and haven for humans and wildlife as well as a nice place for people to walk themselves and their dogs (remember to clean up after them) in all four seasons. I have again been monitoring the bluebird boxes there this season on behalf of the Open Space Committee and making sure that they are in good shape and available to the bluebirds and swallows as opposed to other unwanted, invasive birds. I am very happy to report that three very healthy broods of tree swallows are being raised in three of the boxes, and bluebirds are busily nesting with eggs laid in two of the other boxes.

As of this writing in the middle of June, things are going well, and we have added two new round boxes on the far side of the meadow. These boxes, known as Gilbertsen PVC boxes, seem to discourage unwanted activity from ever-present, invasive house sparrows. So far, so good!

Bluebird boxes are a wonderful way for us to provide safety and shelter for these special wild birds, as well as for us to enjoy the beauty and miracles of the natural world. Please don't open the boxes, and keep your dogs away from them; be assured that they are being well tended and cared for this season. Bluebirds and swallows are both cavity nesters and often raise two to three sets of chicks per year, so we are just getting started! ### Forest and Trails Committee Work Projects

The Town of Conway owns two forested properties: the Fournier lot near the Grammar School and the Town Farm Forest off

Cricket Hill Road. One stated objective of the Stewardship Plans developed to guide the care of these properties is removing invasive species that have become numerous in some areas on both properties. Asiatic bittersweet, honeysuckle, barberry, and multiflora rose are some of the most commonly found perennial invasive species. These threaten the healthy native plant communities that sustain biological richness, plant diversity, and forest resilience.

The Forest and Trails Committee has been removing invasive species, primarily Asiatic honeysuckle, from the trailhead on the Fournier lot. We have made good progress and look forward to completing the trailhead areas at Fournier over the next two months. We are asking interested members of the public to join us in these efforts.

### Community Event to Prevent Tick Bites

Take steps today to prevent ticks from biting, and you'll work toward preventing such tick-borne diseases as Lyme disease and anaplasmosis. The Conway Board of Health is excited to announce a community event to prevent tick bites! On Friday, July 7, from 3:00 to 6:00 p.m.. the board will host a free event to spray shoes with permethrin to prevent ticks from crawling up to bite. Bring your shoes to town hall, and we'll spray them with permethrin,

making them a threat to ticks during the dog days of summer. Your shoes will need to dry overnight, so wear shoes you don't want sprayed. The spray should not change the color of your shoes.

Treating your clothing and shoes with permethrin, a chemical naturally found in chrysanthemum flowers, is a great preventive step. Permethrin can be an invisible spray that can make your clothing (or shoes or hat or tent) a hazard for ticks for weeks at a time. Check directions for any product you consider using!

An easy daily step? Perform a tick check! Make a habit of checking yourself, your children, and your pets for ticks after coming inside, even it you were in your yard, not the woods. To do so, look over your body for poppy seed-sized and larger ticks. Start by checking feet, ankles, legs, and groin, then work your way upward on the torso. Don't forget the armpits and hairline! Ticks hitch a ride after physical contact and tend to crawl upward. Do your tick check thinking like a tick: start low and go up.

### Free Organic Produce at Senior Meals

A grant from Mass in Motion, a statewide movement to ensure that Massachusetts residents have access to healthy, affordable foods and opportunities for safe physical activity, has enabled Conway to purchase shares from Natural Roots, Conway's local horse-powered organic farm. These shares will be picked up from the farm twice a month for distribution at the senior meals held at town hall on the second and fourth Thursdays of the month, Produce is available to all Conway seniors. Until the growing season gets fully under way, the choice of produce will be limited, but we'll soon be enjoying summer's bounty. Please bring your own bags. As always on these days, a nutritious meal will be offered at noon.

### What's Happening at Veterans Memorial Park?

Veterans Memorial Park recently received some much-needed landscaping attention. On June 4, a crew of 14 volunteers organized by *Pollinate Conway!* took the first major step in transforming the weedy, unmowed back area of the park into something more attractive and ecologically beneficial. To smother the rampant poison ivy along the property boundary, we covered the area with thick sheets of cardboard and topped that with several inches of wood chips, a process known as sheet mulching. This summer we plan to extend the area covered with sheet mulch in preparation for future planting of native trees and shrubs, most likely in 2024.

Many thanks to the Conway folks who generously dedicated their time on June 4 – estimated at 64 collective hours – as well as those who pitched in with advance preparations. With your help, we collected a mountain of hefty cardboard (when stacked, the flattened dishwasher-sized boxes reached over five feet in height) and moved over 20 cubic yards of generously donated wood chips from a nearby location via bucket loader and pickup trucks. Check out the results next time you are passing through downtown Conway, and stay tuned for future improvements to the site. ### A Look into Conway History

Poor Farms by Patricia Ann Lynch

I came across an item in the description of Maynard Cemetery that piqued my interest: "The cemetery is off of Cricket Hill Road on the north side of a nameless abandoned road that is lined on both sides with stone walls; it is directly across the old road from a large, deep cellar hole that the 1871 F.W. Beers Atlas of Franklin

County labeled as belonging to 'Z. Bates.' At one time it was the home of the town's poor farm." Conway had once had a poor farm? I had to learn more.

Poor farms, also called "poorhouses" or "almshouses," were county- or town-run residences where indigent people, called

"paupers," were supported at public expense. Poor farms evolved from the English poor laws of the 16th and 17th centuries, which required communities to take responsibility for poverty-stricken residents. These places generally functioned under the direction of an elected or appointed superintendant. Most were working farms on which the more able-bodied were required to labor to produce at least some of the food required to maintain the residents.

Poor farms were common in the United States from around the middle of the 1800s into the early 1900s. After the Social Security Act took effect in 1935, they began to decline, and all were gone by the 1950s.

I could find no reference to a poor farm in *History of Conway* (*Massachusetts*) 1767-1917, nor does Deane Lee's book, *Conway* 1767-1967, contain an entry for "poor farm" or "town farm." This omission might have been because of the shame often associated with these facilities. However, in the Forest Stewardship Plan for the Town Farm Forest (see the town website, <u>conwayma.gov</u>) I found this information: "The Town Farm was purchased by the Town in 1889 from Austin Bates for the creation of an alms farm." Louise Beckett, the treasurer of the Conway Historical Society, greatly aided my research by locating town reports from the 1800s that confirmed the town's support of those in need.

A "pauper farm" existed prior to the purchase of the Bates property. The report for 1867 lists under the town's assets "Pauper Farm and Personal Property Thereon, \$4,693.93," as well as a payment of \$269 for "Agent on Pauper Farm" and one of \$646.37 for "Poor not in Pauper Farm." Annual town reports include expenditures for board, medical attendance and medicine, clothes, funeral expenses, and "Counsel in Pauper Cases." Conway took care not only of its own poor but also for the relief and boarding of transient poor: a total of 126 "tramps" in 1876. The 1910 U.S. Census – the only census I found that reported on residents in individual institutions – showed that in that year the Conway Poor Farm had just four residents. Perhaps they were among the last to live there.

Summer Exhibition: This summer the society's exhibition will focus on Jack Chesbro, Conway's Hall of Famer. The 50 Main Street museum will be open from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m. on Sundays July 9 through August 27. In 1904, pitching for the New York Highlanders – renamed the Yankees in 1913 – Chesbro won an astounding 41 games against 12 losses, racking up 454 innings and 48 complete games, numbers that are unimaginable today. The 1904 season didn't end well for him, however, as he threw a wild pitch in the ninth inning of a tie game against Boston that allowed the winning run to score and lost the Highlanders the American League pennant. The errant pitch nearly sent Chesbro into retirement and clouded his legacy for years.
