Natural Roots Flood Relief GoFundMe



On Monday morning, July 10, the South River jumped its banks and quickly swallowed the main crop fields at Natural Roots Farm in Conway, including the farm's equipment yard and flock of laying hens. All the main crop fields were completely submerged, soil was lost, and crops were flattened, uprooted, or blasted out of the field by the force of the flood. The farmers are anticipating a 100% loss of the food that was growing in those main fields at the time of the flood, and they are turning to their local community for help.

"The financial implications from this event are insurmountable without community support," said farm manager Brittany Terry.

"Losses like this are impossible to absorb into the shoestring margins that farms like ours already work within. As resilient and adaptable as we are, we will be unable to keep our farm going without help, so we have launched a GoFundMe to raise the \$85,000 we need now to cover our lost income and rebuild our farm from the flood."

The farm crew, along with the farm's brave team of horses, was able to rescue most of the chicken flock and most of the farm's equipment from being washed away in the rapidly rising floodwaters. All people and workhorses emerged from the rescue sodden and charged with adrenaline but otherwise safe. Now the farmers are working on assessing the damage, absorbing the regulations around what will be safe to harvest from unaffected plants, and determining what can be replanted in the weeks and months ahead. At this point in the season, however, there is not enough time left to replant most of the crops that were lost.

"The full extent of the flood damage is still unfolding, but it is our intention to continue to steward this land and offer nourishment to our community, who have supported us for over 25 years," said owner David Fisher, who started the farm in 1998. "We are profoundly grateful for all of the community support we are receiving through this extremely challenging time."

Natural Roots is a horse-powered vegetable farm utilizing organic practices along the South River in Conway Massachusetts. They feed over 250 local families with their main season and winter CSA shares and also sell a variety of vegetables to the general public and to local businesses. They offer eggs from pasture-raised chickens and have a small farm store that is open year-round. Established in 1998 by David Fisher on land owned by Christian and Gaella Elwell of South River Miso, Natural Roots Farm also offers one of the only teamster-training apprenticeship programs in the country to aspiring farmers who would like to learn the benefits and skills needed for draft-powered farming.

The farm's GoFundMe campaign is making great progress toward covering losses incurred by the flooding, and the farmers hope the momentum continues. Sharing the gofundme link — gofund.me/a6b55da2 — is the best way to support their recovery efforts right now. The farmers are grateful beyond words for all of the incredible generosity! Another way to support Natural Roots farm through its recovery is to shop at the farm store! The hens have not stopped laying eggs. and the store is as full as ever.

Hazardous Waste Collection Day

Franklin County Solid Waste District is planning to hold the 2023 household hazardous waste collection on Saturday, September 23, at GCC's Main Campus and the Orange Transfer Station. **Residents and businesses must preregister by September 15**. Online preregistration for the 2023 collection will open on August 16, at franklincountywastedistrict.org. Mail-in registration forms will be available in mid-August at town transfer stations and in local newspapers. Participants will be assigned an appointment time to bring wastes to the collection An appointment time and instructions will be provided by mail after registration is processed.

The collection is free for residents of most of the District's 21 member towns. Businesses may participate but must pay for disposal costs. For business registration information, call 413-772-2438.

This collection provides an opportunity to dispose of hazardous items that should not be put in the trash, such as leftover oil-based paints, stains, thinners, pesticides, herbicides, pool chemicals, motor oil, antifreeze, household cleaners, and other household chemicals. A more complete list of acceptable items is at franklincountywastedistrict.org.

Batteries and mercury-containing items such as fluorescent light bulbs, thermometers, and thermostats will not be accepted at this collection. These items, which may contain mercury or heavy metals, should never be put in trash or recycling. Handle carefully, bring them to a municipal transfer station or a Regional Hazardous Waste "Super Site" and hand to an attendant. In addition, fluorescent light bulbs are accepted at Lowe's Stores (all types) and Home Depot (CFLs only).

Forest and Trails Committee Work Project

The Town of Conway owns two forested properties: the Fournier lot near the Grammar School and the Town Farm Forest off Cricket Hill Road. One stated objective of the Stewardship Plans developed to guide the care of these properties is removing invasive species that have become numerous in some areas on both properties. Asiatic bittersweet, honeysuckle, barberry, and multiflora rose are some of the most commonly found perennial invasive species. These threaten the healthy native plant communities that sustain biological richness, plant diversity, and forest resilience.

The Forest and Trails Committee has been removing invasive species, primarily Asiatic honeysuckle, from the trailhead on the Fournier lot. We have made good progress and look forward to completing the trailhead areas at Fournier this month. We are asking interested members of the public to join us in this effort.

At the Historical Society

This photograph, mounted on cardboard stock, shows what is likely a town road grading crew: two men holding hand tools, while another

two are operating the horse-drawn wagon, rigged as a primitive road grader. One man controls the team, while a second at the rear operates the metal blade. This crew may be related to the Solomon Pease family and Burkeville Stable of the late 1800s. A similar image in the Society's collection of a road crew associated with Solomon Pease, the road commissioner at the time, is dated circa 1890. The first motorized, self-propelled road graders came to market in the 1920s, with young companies like Caterpillar adapting and advancing the design into the modern era.

Today's modern graders can cost up to \$100,000 and beyond, and are powered by up to 150 horses or more. Quite a change from the late 19th century.

Update from the Field Memorial Library

On July 15 we held a multifaceted celebration of the 122nd birthday of our library. In addition to acknowledging our Conway landmark's 122nd birthday, we celebrated the completion of our entry into the "digiverse" of CWMars and honored the many volunteers who gave so much time to make this possible. Our entry into the library's digital network marks the first change in operation in those 122 years!

To give you a small idea of what this means to the library, our circulation has doubled – even tripled – since we opened to CWMars on December 7, 2022. For example, in just one of the two days *every week* that we process requests from CWMars, we served our collection to patrons in Westfield, Dalton, Sheffield, Wilbraham, Florence, Westminster, Westhampton, Douglas, Longmeadow,

Monson, Turners Falls, Belchertown, Agawam, Deerfield, Northampton, Bernardston, and Hadley. That's 17 on a Monday. Typically, another 25 from other libraries and returns to the FML arrive on Wednesdays. This provides a snapshot of 42 items a week circulating both *from* our collection to others and from other libraries *to* Conway patrons. These are net additions to our circulation numbers since joining CW Mars. Which means, by the way, that by processing these items our workload has doubled!

Also on July 15, we celebrated the tenth anniversary of our current Friends of the Library group, who put so much time and effort into making resources available to the library and its patrons. Although we have a magnificent building, our operating budget is thin, and we are grateful for their help. Please consider joining our Friends group to help expand the library programs that they provide. We are grateful to those who volunteer in programs and events and who contribute funds to library operations through the Friends group. You make a difference!

August is prime vacation time, and that will be true at the library while our staff take some time to recharge and plan for the year ahead. However, the library will be open during its regular hours. You will see some new faces at the desk, because we have recruited a fabulous group of retired librarians and library aficionados to substitute at the desk in August.
