Massachusetts E-Bike Voucher Program

The Massachusetts E-Bike Voucher Program demonstrates the state's commitment toward expanding access to clean transportation. By providing a voucher that reduces the cost of an e-bike, the program contributes to the commonwealth's goal of providing affordable and accessible electrified transportation for low- and moderate-income residents. Vouchers of \$800 to \$1,200, depending on eligibility, will be awarded via random selection. The program is part of the state's strategy to reduce growth in vehicle miles traveled and greenhouse gas emissions.

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will never exceed the total cost of an e-bike. Two types of vouchers are offered: standard and enhanced. The table below provides an overview of the available vouchers.

LifePath Awards Grants to Eleven Organizations

LifePath has awarded funding to eleven community-based organizations in the first year of the annual Age and Dementia Friendly Community Grants initiative. These one-time grants support projects that improve accessibility, foster inclusion, and promote the well-being of older adults and people living with dementia across our region. These awards are supported with funding from Point32Health Foundation, the philanthropic arm of Harvard Pilgrim Health Care and Tufts Health Plan, and the Community Health Improvement Plan Network, a project of the Franklin Regional Council of Governments. Grants of up to \$3,000 were awarded to support initiatives aligned with the Age and Dementia Friendly Action Plan, a blueprint for building safer, welcoming, and equitable communities for all ages and abilities.

Among the eleven organizations was Conway's Mass in Motion /Age-Friendly Committee, which received grants for both the creation of a one-stop home repair resource portal for older adults and the launch of an on-demand senior transportation service, improving access to daily needs, events, and social opportunities. The other grants were to the Greenfield Council on Aging, Greenfield Housing Authority, Leverett Library, Mount Grace Land Conservation Trust, Northfield Senior Center, Rowe Council on Aging, Shelburne Senior Center, the Towns of Ashfield and Athol, and Village Neighbors.

Regional Repair Event

The Franklin County Solid Waste District is working in conjunction with the Franklin County Technical School to host a repair event on Saturday, May 31, from 9:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. at the Tech School, 82 Industrial Blvd., Turners Falls. This event is free and open to all residents of solid waste district member towns: Bernardston, Buckland, Charlemont, Colrain, Conway, Deerfield, Erving, Gill, Hawley, Heath, Leverett, Montague, New Salem, Northfield, Orange, Rowe, Shelburne, Sunderland, Warwick, Wendell, and Whately.

A combination of Tech School students and instructors plus other "fixers" will help residents with small electrical repairs, such as rewiring lamps. The Tech School will also offer a sharpening service for knives, scissors, tools, chainsaws, and lawn mower blades. No registration is required for this event. 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"Clean Sweep" Bulky Waste Collection

Franklin County Solid Waste Management District is holding its "Clean Sweep" Bulky Waste Collection days on May 17 and October 18 from 9:00 a.m. to noon at these three collection sites: Erving Highway Garage, 16 Public Works Boulevard; Mohawk Trail Regional High School, 26 Ashfield Road (Route 112 South); and Whately Transfer Station, 73 Christian Lane (off Routes 5 & 10). Residents from any of the district's 21 member towns may bring bulky items such as tires, scrap metal, appliances (doors must be removed from refrigerators and freezers), upholstered furniture, carpeting, construction and demolition debris, computers, televisions, electronics, VCRs, microwaves, propane tanks (20 lb. and 1 lb.), fire extinguishers, and the like. Note: Mattresses are not accepted at this collection. No preregistration is necessary. Please do not bring yard waste, brush, tree stumps, asbestos, paint, auto batteries, oil tanks, hazardous materials, or trash.

There are charges for most items. Disposal fees, cash only, will be collected during check-in at each site. A price list for the most common items is at <u>franklincountywastedistrict.org</u>. More information is on the website or you can call 413-772-2438.

News from the Board of Health

Watch out for ticks! Ticks can transmit diseases to humans when they bite. The longer a tick remains attached to the skin, the higher the likelihood that it may spread bacteria that cause tick-borne illnesses.

In 2023, over 250 ticks from Franklin County were tested for tick-borne disease. Lyme disease was found in ticks from 65% of Franklin County towns. Although only deer ticks (aka black-legged ticks) can transmit Lyme, babesiosis, and anaplasmosis, other ticks should be avoided because they can transmit less-common diseases, such as Rocky Mountain spotted fever and tularemia.

Luckily, there are many actions we can take to prevent tick-borne diseases:

- When outdoors, stick to hiking trails, wear light-colored clothing to see ticks more easily, and tuck in loose ends.
- Brush your clothing off with your hands or a lint roller before coming inside to reduce what you carry indoors.
- Showering within two hours can help wash off ticks before they bite and become embedded. Use a washcloth and do a good "tick scrub."
- Make a habit of checking yourself, your children, and your pets for ticks after coming inside. Think like a tick: Ticks often hitch a ride after you make physical contact with brushy plants. Start by checking feet, ankles, legs, and groin, then work your way upward.
- Use tick repellents. DEET, picardin, and oil of lemon eucalyptus can be used on skin. Use as directed. Pretreat clothing, including socks and shoes, with permethrin (not to be put on skin). Permethrin is invisible, odorless, and stays effective in fabric through many washings. Using skin and clothing repellents together is recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and the Department of Defense.

Want to identify a tick? Send a photo to Tick Encounter <u>tickencounter.org</u> to learn about the tick and your risk level. You'll hear from a tick expert in about 24 hours when using this free service, which is run through the University of Rhode Island.

Conway Historical Society News

Join the Conway Historical Society on Thursday May 8, at 7:00 p.m. at the Conway Historical Society Museum, 50 Main Street, for a presentation by Conway resident Philip Kantor titled "Ely's Insurrection of 1782 as Viewed by Joseph Hawley." Ely's Insurrection was the forerunner of Shay's Rebellion five years later and was the single largest and most serious protest movement during the American Revolution. Its namesake, Samuel Ely, was a Conway resident, clergyman, and war hero. The insurrection itself – and the subsequent freeing of Samuel Ely from prison – was led by notable Conway residents and Continental Army officers Captain Abel Dinsmore and Lieutenant Perez Bardwell.

This presentation will discuss the insurrection and the life of Samuel Ely through the writings of three prominent contemporaries: John Adams, Samuel Adams, and Joseph Hawley. Hawley and his remarkable life will be a primary focus of the talk. This talk is free and open to the public. Donations welcome; refreshments will be served.

Splendid Book Chat

The first book I've selected for this month is *The Legacy* by Nevil Shute (William Morrow and Company, 1950). The story begins a few years after World War II with a lawyer's search for the heir to a fortune. Jean Paget, surprised by this unexpected legacy, decides to fulfill a dream she dared share with only one other person: a dream that sustained her during the dark, horror-filled years of the war she spent as a prisoner of the Japanese in Malaya. Facing the terrors of her past unexpectedly opens a new path that may lead her to the fulfillment of her ultimate dream of a place in which she can come alive and share a love that seems impossible. I would like to go on and on here, but I don't want to rob you, the reader, of the charm of discovery of what comes next for Jean. I've read this wonderful story so many times that the pages are falling out of my copy! (Note: The Legacy was published in England under the title A Town Like Alice, and while there have been good movie and miniseries adaptations, I've always found the book better.)

My second selection is *Last of the Breed* by Louis L'Amour (Bantam Books, 1986). L'Amour authored 100 novels and 250 short stories, most of them westerns set on the American frontier, but this one's locale is a whole other continent. It's the story of Major Joe Makatozi (Joe Mack), a man who lives in two worlds: as a part-Sioux/part-Cheyenne steeped in the traditions of his ancestors, and as a U.S. Air Force pilot. Joe is shot down over the Bering Strait while testing a military aircraft and captured by the Soviets. He is determined to escape and somehow return to the United States. My copy of the book contains a map that shows the enormous swath of land he must travel on foot across the vast and deadly Siberian wilderness to make his escape. *Hopeless, impossible, ridiculous* are words that describe such an attempt. What follows is an epic tale of unbending will, grit, and determination befitting a L'Amour character: a character who must fight for his life using the ancient survival skills of his forebears.

The Rvan Scholarship The Friends of the Field Memorial Library welcome applications for the Ryan Scholarship. Conway was labeled "the wettest place in America for the month of July" in 2023. The scholarship is, in part, a response to that dubious distinction. It is named to honor the life and work of Ryan Walsh Martel, who grew up in Conway and died from brain cancer in 2022 at the age of 41. Ryan's life work was in energy policy. He had a passion for reducing the impact of climate change for the sake of future generations. The scholarship (\$3,000) will be awarded to the Conway high school graduating senior who presents the best plan, through education or work, to lessen the impact of climate change and thus carry on Ryan's legacy.
