Notes from the Town Administrator

Annual Town Meeting will be held on Saturday, June 7, at 10:00 a.m. at the Conway Grammar School. The town warrant, warrant "lite" voter guide, FY2026 budget, and town annual report are all available on the town website at conwayma.gov under "Departments" and then "Town Meeting." Town meeting represents the time when all residents get an equal say in what matters to them most and therefore how the town spends its funds. I encourage all of you to attend and vote on what matters to you!

I wanted to give a quick update on the grant projects on which the town is currently working. Conway was awarded a Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness (MVP) 2.0 grant, which we are doing jointly with Ashfield. This grant is required in order to stay in the MVP grant program, and the idea is to update our previous 2018 plan (also done jointly with Ashfield; that plan is available on the website), which outlines projects the town can undertake to help mitigate the effects of climate change as well as to bring new voices and views to the process. The total grant award is for \$175,000 to be shared between the two towns, and we are currently in the very beginning stages of this two-year grant program.

The town is also finalizing a one million dollar grant with MassWorks, which will help with the costs associated with installing new infrastructure (pipes and catch basins) as well as paving for Upper Baptist and Baptist Hill roads, replacing the culvert on Emerson Hollow Road, and repaving the remaining portion of Shelburne Falls Road.

We are also looking into updating our Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) self-evaluation plan to include the Transfer Station, emergency shelter, and town website, in anticipation of applying the following year for a Massachusetts Office of Disability (MOD) grant to help purchase a LULA (limited use limited application) lift for Town Hall.

Many changes will be happening at the Transfer Station this season. Soon the old Conway Mall building will be demolished, and Hometown Structures will come in to prepare the site for the new 14' x 30' swap shop shed, which will be purchased in part with \$6,000 in grant funding from Mass DEP. The Transfer Station attendants' shed will be updated with insulation, the front gate will be fixed, and the two depressions in the back of the paved area will be filled in and the area repaved.

News from the Board of Health

Preventing rabies. Rabies is a serious disease that affects mammals: wild animals, pets, and, rarely, people. Rabies has been found in more than 5,000 animals in Massachusetts since 1992. Local boards of health respond to numerous incidents of potential or confirmed rabies exposure each year. The rabies virus spreads when saliva of an infected animal gets into the nose, mouth, eyes, or wound of another animal.

Preventing contact between wild animals and people (and our pets!) is a great way to prevent the spread of rabies to humans. Enjoy wild animals from a distance and teach children never to approach animals they don't know, even if they appear friendly. You cannot tell whether an animal has rabies simply by looking at

it. Vaccinate your pets against rabies and don't feed or water your pets outside; even empty bowls attract wild animals.

If bitten or scratched by a bat or other wild animal, immediately wash the wound with water and soap for ten minutes. Call your health care provider and the cooperative public health service that serves Conway's Board of Health at 413-774-3167 x 106. The health service will get in touch with your town's animal control officer and/or inspector. If your pet is bitten or scratched, call your veterinarian and the Franklin County Sheriff's Office Regional Animal Control at 413-774-7340.

If a bat is found in a room with a sleeping person, an unattended young child, a mentally incapacitated person, or a pet, the bat should be safely captured and tested for rabies. Bat bites may not leave visible wounds. If you suspect possible contact with a bat, call your health care provider and the public health service at the number given. More information, prevention tips, and how to capture a bat can be found at mass.gov/rabies.

Be prepared for measles! We are experiencing an outbreak of measles across the United States. As of May 13 there have been no confirmed cases in Massachusetts; however, there have been some regionally, including in Vermont, Rhode Island, New York State, and New Jersey. Check your MMR vaccination status now to assure that you and other members of your family are protected before the virus arrives here. Contact your health care provider if you need help checking your status and for information about how to get vaccinated if necessary. More information on measles can be found at mass.gov/info-measles.

Splendid Book Chat

The first book I selected for this month is *Simple: The Easiest Cookbook in the World* by Jean-Francois Mallet (Black Dog and Leventhal Publishers, 2016). Can the bold claim of its title be true? In pursuit of answers, I cracked open this book's unattractive black and yellow cover. The author, a skilled chef, is also a food photographer. With few words and many sumptuous photographs, he has created easily understandable recipes containing "no more than six ingredients and four steps": another claim that holds true throughout the book. I can't prove the claims of its title decisively, but after trying some recipes I can say that they are a joy to look at, easy to follow, and pleasing to the palate. Two standout favorites are Orange Beef Meatballs and the gorgeous Pear Clafoutis Tart. Note: The instructions page at the front of the book is helpful in following methods called for in the recipes.

The second selection is *North and South* by Elizabeth Cleghorn Gaskell (John Lehmann Ltd., 1855). This marvelous book follows young Margaret Hale, whose life and the world around her is undergoing rapid change. Margaret and her family are uprooted from their quiet life in a gentle hamlet in the rural south of England to the fictional city of Milton in the industrial north. The Industrial Revolution is roaring along in Milton, and Margaret and her family witness the harsh realities of the distance between wealthy manufacturers and mill owners and their hard-working, poverty-stricken employees. Margaret's values are tested as she sympathizes with the mill workers but is at the same tine drawn to an influential mill owner. Circumstances eventually lead to Margaret's need to make a choice that will enable her to follow her heart's true path forward. Note: the BBC produced an excellent four-part miniseries in 2004 that might be as good as the book.

He had a passion for reducing the impact of climate change for the sake of future generations. The scholarship (\$3,000) will be awarded to the Conway high school graduating senior who presents the best plan, through education or work, to lessen the impact of climate change and thus carry on Ryan's legacy. 


